Call to Order:

Chairman Robert Duval called meeting #275 of the Air Resources Council (ARC) to order at 9:07 a.m. on Monday March 14, 2022. Chair Robert Duval announced that the council had a quorum.

Approval of Minutes:

A motion to approve the minutes of meeting #274 moved by moved by Elizabeth (Lynn) Tillotson and seconded by Jay Leduc. All were in favor, motion passed.

Division Activities and Legislative Update:

Chairman Robert Duval introduced Director Craig Wright of the Air Resources Division (ARD), who updated members of the ARC regarding issues relative to the ARD, including:

New Staff in ARD:

Pat North – Pat, a former administrator of ARD's Environmental Health Program, has returned on a part time basis to assist with our rollout of the new air toxics rule and to assist with some permitting projects. She will also be providing her expertise to the Environmental Health Program as needed.

Jennifer Galbraith – Jen previously worked at DES in the early 2000s as an air quality modeler. She left to teach at the NH Technical Institute for several years and worked in the solar industry prior to returning to DES as an air permit engineer.

Dr. Kelly Thrippleton-Hunter – Kelly has joined the Environmental Health Program as a health risk assessor in our APPLETREE Program. Prior to coming to DES, Kelly was a professor at Southern NH University.

Director Wright mentioned that David Smith who is one of ARD's Inspector in our Compliance Bureau is on active military leave with the Army Reserves – Mr. Smith is expected to be gone 4 months minimum.

Open Recruitments – 7 Positions

3 positions in the Technical Services Bureau

3 positions in the Compliance Bureau

1 position in the Director's Office

Future Retirements – Currently estimate that 8 senior level staff will retire within 3 years.

Permitting Environmental Health Updates:

Presentation to NH Chapter of American Council of Engineering Companies (ACEC): On January 21st, 2022, the NHDES Environmental Health Program presented an overview of their program to the NH chapter of the ACEC. The presentation covered the work the Environmental Health Program is doing to establish ambient groundwater quality standards, as well its work under a (3-year) cooperative agreement with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, Air Toxics Substances and Disease Registry (CDC-ATSDR).

2. Updates to Chapter Env-A 1400, Regulated Toxic Air Pollutants:

Changes to Env-A 1400, *Regulated Toxic Air Pollutants* were most recently adopted on February 3, 2022. Sources subject to the air toxics rule have 90 days from adoption of the most recent updates to evaluate their compliance status and demonstrate that their emissions comply with the revised rule. If a new permit or permit revision is needed, facilities need to submit a compliance plan and permit application by May 3, 2022.

Budget Related Items

DES received an additional \$149,000 from EPA in our Section 103 Grant to establish a new air monitoring site in Laconia. The new site will monitor for both PM2.5 and ozone.

We have started the FY 24/25 budget process for both the Operating and Capital Budgets

Our first step is related to Capital Budgets – for the last 3 cycles we have requested and received about \$200,000 for each 2-year cycle

ARD's first request this year is to double that request - pending approval by the CO

Federal Updates:

EPA proposed a new Cross State Air Pollution Rule on March 11

Supreme Court held oral arguments on a climate case related to EPAs authorities on February 28. A decision is expected in June

On March 9 EPA reinstated the California waiver which allows California and other 177 states to enforce more stringent auto emission standards. 16 other states have adopted the California Stands. NH has not adopted CA standards. The waiver was revoked under the previous administration

ARD Technical Service Update:

Tim White, Supervisor VII gave an update on the Volkswagen Settlement.

New Business:

Mike Haley the Attorney from the New Hampshire Department of Justice addressed the Council in reference to updating Rule ENV-AC 200 *Procedural Rules-Air Resources Council*. Mr. Haley stated that the Wetlands Bureau has recently updated theirs and feels that the Air Council should compare Wetlands rules with the existing rules that are already in place for the Air Council. This will be a topic of discussion at our next Air Council meeting that is scheduled for Monday April 11, 2022.

Call to Order:

Chairman Robert Duval called meeting #276 of the Air Resources Council (ARC) to order at 9:05 a.m. on Monday May 9, 2022. Chair Robert Duval announced that the council had a quorum present.

Approval of Minutes:

A motion to approve the minutes of meeting #275 moved by J. Ryan Bielagus and seconded by David Cribbie. All were in favor, motion passed.

Division Activities and Legislative Update:

Chairman Robert Duval introduced Director Craig Wright of the Air Resources Division (ARD), who updated members of the ARC regarding issues relative to the ARD, including:

1. EBC New Hampshire Webinar: Efforts to Address Environmental Justice in NH-Update from March 14, 2022 Air Council meeting:

On April 19, 2022, Karen Craver, the Administrator of DES Environmental Health Program, participated in the NH Environmental Business Council webinar on Environmental Justice in New Hampshire. This webinar introduced participants to environmental justice leaders form the EPA, the NH DES, and from local organizations and institutions. The goal of the meeting was to explore how federal; state and Community groups are currently taking action to advance and promote environmental justice. The webinar had approximately 60 attendees, and the EBC has asked us to partner with them again in the future.

2. Updates to Chapter Env-A 1400, Regulated Toxic Air Pollutants:

Changes to Env-A 1400, *Regulated Toxic Air Pollutants* were most recently adopted on February 3, 2022. Sources subject to the air toxics rule have 90 days from adoption (until May 3rd, 2022) to evaluate their compliance status and demonstrate that their emissions comply with the revised rule, or if necessary, apply for a new permit or permit revision. To date, we have received submittals from approximately 12 facilities that either need to obtain/amend a permit or have requested determinations from the Department regarding the application of the recent rule revisions.

3. Volkswagen Update: DES has ranked the project and will begin the G&C process to approve the

contracts. DES will provide further information at our upcoming Air Council meetings.

- 4. NEVU Update: DOT is the lead, will have \$17M in federal money for EV infrastructure over 5 years. DES is assisting with the corridor designations and will be assisting with public outreach. In effort to coordinate with DOT and the DES VW funds the lead DOT staff person was on the DES VW RFP scoring committee.
- **5. Permit Fee Update:** DES held the fee consistent with the 2021 fee rate Emission report were due April 25, 2022. DES will provide further information at our upcoming Air Council meetings.
- 6. Regional HZE SIP: NHDES Air Resources Division submitted the periodic comprehensive revision to the NH Regional Haze State Implementation Plan (SIP) for the second planning period to EPA on May 5, 2022. The plan was due July 31, 2021. This SIP update represents the culmination of years of technical work performed in partnership with states, tribes, stakeholders, EPA and Federal Land Managers. On April 7, 2022, EPA announced its intent to make findings that certain states have failed to submit regional haze implementation plans for the second planning period. The EPA intends to issue these findings by August 31, 2022, however States that submit their second planning period SIPs by August 15, 2022, may avoid inclusion in the findings of failure to submit.

Rules:

Env-A 600, Statewide Permit System

Karla McManus, Planning and Rules Manager

Env-A 600, *Statewide Permit System*, is due to expire on September 1, 2022. The purpose of this chapter is to implement the permitting requirements of RSA 125-C and RSA 125-I to regulate the operation and modification of new and existing stationary sources, area sources and devices in order to achieve and maintain the ambient air quality standards established pursuant to RSA 125-C and Env-A 300; and the ambient air limits for regulated toxic air pollutants established pursuant to RSA 125-I and Env-A 1400. This chapter applies to each stationary source, area source, and device that is required by RSA 125-C:11 to possess a temporary permit or operating permit.

The Air Resources Division (ARD) is readopting this rule without any changes. ARD has spent the past two years working with permitting staff on changes that need to be made to make the rule clearer for sources and to make sure the rule is in compliance with federal laws. The details of the language are still in process and need more time. Since Env-A 600 is the cornerstone of ARD and our State Implementation Plan, we need input from the United States Environmental Protection Agency and from our stakeholders before we move ahead. Therefore, we are proposing to readopt the current rule without any changes so that it doesn't expire while we are working on re-writing Env-A 600.

Several ARC members expressed concern that the public may be misled by this re-adoption without changes is interim in nature and will soon be followed by substantive changes. DES agreed to inform the public of this intent. Council member Elizabeth Tillotson moved to start the 15-day clock, seconded by Kris Blomback; the motion passed unanimously.

Readoption of Env-A 2400, Ferrous and Non-Ferrous Foundries, Smelters, and Investment Casting Operations

Karla McManus, Planning and Rules Manager / Sheila Rydel, NSR Program Manager Env-A 2400, Ferrous and Non-Ferrous Foundries, Smelters, and Investment Casting Operations, is due to expire on April 23, 2023. The purpose of this chapter is to establish emissions standards for particulate matter and visible emissions from ferrous and non-ferrous foundries, smelters, and investment casting operations.

The Air Resources Division is readopting this rule without any changes except for the deletion of Part 2405, *Affirmative Defenses for Violations of Visible Emission Standards*. This part is being deleted because on September 17, 2014, the EPA issued a supplemental notice of proposed rulemaking (SNPR, 79 FR 55920) amending its February 22, 2013 (78 FR 12459) proposed rule made in response to a petition for rulemaking that the Sierra Club filed with the EPA. At issue was whether the EPA can allow an affirmative defense for excess emissions from a permitted source during start-up, shut-down, or malfunction (SSM) of equipment because, as asserted by the Sierra Club the EPA's policy with regard to SSM can "undermine the emission limits in SIPs and threaten states' abilities to achieve and maintain the NAAQS, thereby threatening public health and public welfare..." Subsequent to EPA's issuance of the February 2013 proposal, a federal court ruled, based on a case brought by the NRDC, that CAA sections 113 and 304 preclude EPA authority to create affirmative defense provisions in the Agency's own regulations imposing emission limits on sources, because such provisions purport to alter the jurisdiction of federal courts to assess liability and impose penalties for violations of those limits in private civil enforcement cases. Therefore, the EPA is requiring states to remove any affirmative defense language from existing rules and not include them in future rules.

After a discussion between the Council and ARD; ARD decided to withdraw this rule at this time and hold additional meetings with stakeholder groups to discuss SSM policy.

Readoption of Env-A 2700, Hot Mix Asphalt Plants

Karla McManus, Planning and Rules Manager / Sheila Rydel, NSR Program Manager Env-A 2700, Hot Mix Asphalt Plants, is due to expire on February 16, 2023. The purpose of this chapter is to establish standards for regulating visible emissions, particulate matter emissions, and fugitive emissions from hot mix asphalt plants. The Air Resources Division is readopting this rule without any changes.

Council member Rudy Cartier moved to start the 15-day clock, seconded by Elizabeth Tillotson; the motion passed unanimously.

Readoption of Env-A 200, Procedural Rules

Karla McManus, Planning and Rules Manager

ARD is proposing to readopt Env-A 200, *Procedural Rules*, with minor changes because it is due to expire on September 25, 2022. Minor edits were made for purposes of clarity.

Council member David Cribbie moved to start the 15-day clock, seconded by J. Ryan Bielagus. Motion passed with all members voting yes, except member Rudy Cartier Jr., who was opposed.

New Business:

Chair Robert Duval advised the council that Rudy Cartier Jr. has volunteered to serve as Vice Chair for the Air Council. Chair Duval expressed thanks to member Cartier for his willingness to take on this role and asked if the ARC would endorse Mr. Cartier for this position to the Governor and Council. Motion by Kris Blomback and second by J. Ryan Bielagus. The motion passed unanimously.

Division Activities and Legislative Update:

Chairman Robert Duval introduced Director Craig Wright of the Air Resources Division (ARD), who updated members of the ARC regarding issues relative to the ARD, including:

- USEPA Releases "Our Nation's Air: Trends Through 2021": On June 1st, the USEPA released its annual report that tracks progress in controlling air pollution. The interactive report, "Our Nation's Air: Trends Through 2021," focuses on nation-wide criteria and toxic air pollutants reductions. The report is available on the USEPA website (at https://gispub.epa.gov/air/trendsreport/2022/#home).
- 2. Withdrawal of Air Permit Application for Proposed Granite State Landfill in Dalton: In a letter dated May 31st, Granite State Landfill, LLC (GSL), a subsidiary of Casella Waste Systems, requested the withdrawal of the air permit application they had submitted in June 2021 for a proposed landfill in Dalton. The letter states that GSL intends to "modify and resubmit the Temporary Permit application in a few months."
- 3. Environmental Health Program Participation in DES Ground Water Trust Drinking Water Source Protection Conference: The Environmental Health Program (EHP) presented at the NHDES and American Ground Water Trust Drinking Water Source Protection Conference on May 25th. The presentation was aimed at educating audience members about the work that is done by the EHP and promoting partnerships with the EHP.

4. New Resource for Local Community Leaders - NH Environmental Health Guide: With funding from the CDC's Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry (ATSDR), the APPLETREE (ATSDR's Partnership to Promote Local Efforts to Reduce Environmental Exposures) team in the Environmental Health Program established a contract with Dartmouth College to develop several resources aimed at supporting local leaders in their response to community concerns about environmental health. One resource, the <u>New Hampshire Environmental Health Guide</u>, has now been posted on the NHDES website. The guide, which points users to state and federal resources by topic area, was developed with stakeholder input from municipal officials, state elected officials, and health care providers

Status of Appeals: Jaime Martinez, Legal Coordinator

Acting Appeals Clerk, Jaime Martinez advised the Council there were no new appeals to report.

Rules:

Chair Robert Duval advised the council that this would be a good time to discuss revisions to the Air Council Organizational Rules.

Chair Duval explained the background and reason for updating Council organizational rules, starting with a legislative change that replaced the Council Chair as presiding officer for appeals with a Hearings Officer appointed by the Attorney General. This change dates back over ten years now.

Chair Duval pointed out that the Wetlands Council recently updated their rules to account for this change along with other updates and clarifications, and these have now been approved by JLCAR. He pointed out that RSA 21 does require the Councils to match up their rules as closely as possible. This will have the additional benefit of facilitating future appeals that may cut across multiple Council jurisdictions.

He suggested the best approach would be to follow the numbering format and content of the new Wetlands Council rules as closely as possible, making appropriate markups changes to statutory citations and other water-related items, rather than attempting to re-write the current Air Council rules.

In response to Council questions, Acting Appeals Clerk Jaime Martinez informed the Council that the Wetlands Council's recently adopted rules specifically state that the Hearing Officer determines the legal sufficiency of an appeal including such matters as standing and jurisdiction. It also introduces e-filing as an alternative to paper.

Mr. Martinez suggested the Council seek legal advice from the Council's DOJ attorney, Michael Haley, on specific procedures for adopting revised Air Council rules.

New Business:

Public Commentary: Katie Lajoie addressed the Council to present a letter she had submitted to state government officials on June 5th regarding persistent toxic substances such as lead, mercury, cadmium, dioxin, and PFAS. The letter had not yet been forwarded to the Council. Copies of the letter were made and distributed at the meeting. Ms. Lajoie explained that her group "Working on Waste" believes that current state regulations are inadequate in respect to these materials, and do not consider effects of bio-accumulation and interaction. Chair Duval thanked Ms. Lajoie for her comments and said the Council would read the letter and consider its recommendations within its role as advisor on long-range planning to the Air Division.

Rules Proposed Readoption of Env-A 1800, Asbestos Management and Control

Karla McManus, Planning and Rules Manager Sheri Eldridge, Compliance Bureau Administrator Ray Walters, Field Manager

ARD has drafted a proposed readoption with amendments to Env-A 1800, *Asbestos Management and Control*, with stakeholder and EPA input. ARD conducted two stakeholder meetings to receive feedback on the proposed changes. This rule protects the health of the general public by ensuring that asbestos is managed in a manner that minimizes the release of asbestos fibers to the environment and human exposure thereto.

Env-A 1800 has been reorganized and re-written to:

Fulfill the RSA 141-E:1 directive for NHDES "... to control the exposure of the public to asbestos by regulation of asbestos abatement and asbestos disposal site activities. The intent of this chapter is not to overburden the unknowing homeowner, but rather to assure commercial and industrial compliance with asbestos disposal site regulation and asbestos abatement efforts." Maintain minimum requirements that will be at least as stringent as the federal requirements in 40 CFR 61, Subpart M.

Implement enforceable, practical changes which streamline and clarify requirements in the rule.

Changes to the rule include the following:

Revise and consolidate all requirements for homeowners into one part of the rule (Env-A 1803) Definition changes

Add definitions of dwelling (Env-A 1802.22) and homeowner (Env-A 1802.32)

Simplify the definition of major asbestos abatement (Env-A 1802.36)

Revise definition of rental dwelling (Env-A 1802.44)

Changes to inspections

Expand inspection requirements (Env-A 1804.01(a) – (d), (g) (h))

Add exemptions to inspections (Env-A 1804.01(e) and (f))

Revise recordkeeping requirements (Env-A 1805)

Revise notification requirements (Env-A 1806)

Clarify the procedures for ordered demolition (Env-A 1806.04(e)) and emergency abatement (Env-A 1806.05)

Add an exemption to demolition work practice requirement for moving intact structures (Env-A 1809.01(c))

Streamline glovebag requirements (Env-A 1811.01) and alternative procedure process (Env-A 1811.02)

Revise asbestos removal requirements to allow for no wetting if below freezing (Env-A 1812.01) Expand and clarify waste shipment record requirements (Env-A 1812.03)

Clarify requirements for approved training and accredited training (Env-A 1814) Modify application fees in Env-A 1815.09 for entities (same initial and renewal) and replacements (free for 1st one, then \$20) Revise license and certification denial, suspension, and revocation (Env-A 1815.03/1815.08/1815.10; Env-A 1817.07/1817.08; and Env-A 1818.05/1818.06) Clarify training requirements for all license/certification types (Env-A 1815.13 and 1815.14; Env-A 1819) Streamline requirements for entity licenses and personnel certifications (Env-A 1815 and Env- A 1816) Revise asbestos disposal site contractor and worker requirements (Env-A 1817 and 1818)

ARD is proposing to amend Env-A 1303.02 and Env-A 1303.04, *Definitions and Recordkeeping for Startup, Shutdown and Low-Load Operation,* in accordance with a request by EPA to align our rules with the federal standards, so our NOx Reasonably Available Control Technology (RACT) requirements can be approved as part of the RACT Certification for the 2008 Ozone NAAQS State Implementation Plan (SIP) that ARD submitted to EPA on September 5, 2018.

The current rule outlines the provisions of RACT applicable to utility boilers with a combined maximum heat output rate which exceeds 50 million British thermal units (Btu) per hour at any time after December 31, 1989, to satisfy the RACT SIP requirements for a major source of NOx. As a state located within the Ozone Transport Region, New Hampshire is required to adopt RACT requirements into the SIP under Title I of the Clean Air Act, Section 184(b).

EPA staff identified the attached rule changes that are necessary for them to take final action on the NH SIP submittal, specifically a revision to the definition of low-load operation and additional recordkeeping requirements for startup, shutdown, and low-load operations. The proposed changes were also reviewed and developed with input from the affected facility.

New Hampshire submitted the RACT Certification after EPA issued a Finding of Failure to Submit on March 6, 2017 (82 FR 9158). The proposed revisions support EPA's approval of New Hampshire's submitted RACT Certification, so EPA will not have to issue a Federal Implementation Plan (FIP) to New Hampshire. Chairman Duval asked Director Wright about the "Failure to Submit" notice. Director Wright explained that startup/shutdown guidance rules were evolving at the time, and ARD was working with EPA to identify appropriate changes to NH rules before completing the SIP.

Chairman Duval asked Member Tillotson whether she had any comments on these proposed rules. She explained she had previous discussions with ARD staff in previous workshops on these rules, and had no further comments at this time.

J. Ryan Bielagus motioned to start the 15-day clock and Council member David Cribbie second the motion. All were in favor, motion passed.

4. Proposed Readoption of Env-A 1600, Fuel Specifications Karla McManus, Planning and Rules Manager John McCutcheon, Title V Permit Engineer

ARD is proposing to readopt Env-A 1600, *Fuel Specifications*, without any changes. The purpose of this rule is to prevent, abate, and control pollutants emitted into the ambient air by controlling the use of fuels containing specific pollutant elements and compounds, pursuant to RSA 125-C:6, II. It is due to expire on September 23, 2023. There was general discussion of fuel specifications in nearby states.

Lynn Tillotson motioned to start the 15-day clock and Council member Georgia Murray second the motion. All were in favor, motion passed.

New Business: None

Public Commentary: John Tuthill from Acworth asked the Council if the drafts that were discussed at today's meeting will be available to the public. Chair Robert Duval clarified to Mr. Tuthill that under state statutes, DES' draft rules are reviewed first with the Air Council members, who have 15 days to make advance comments before the drafts are released by DES to the general public. Chair Duval explained that in general all materials discussed at ARC meetings are public information, and copies can be provided upon request; alternatively, the drafts will be made public to all in 15 days' time.

Adjourn:

Having no further business to discuss, a motion to adjourn was made by J. Ryan Bielagus and seconded by Vice Chair Rudy Cartier Jr. All were in favor and Meeting #278 of the Air Resources Council adjourned at 9:59 am on November 14, 2022.
